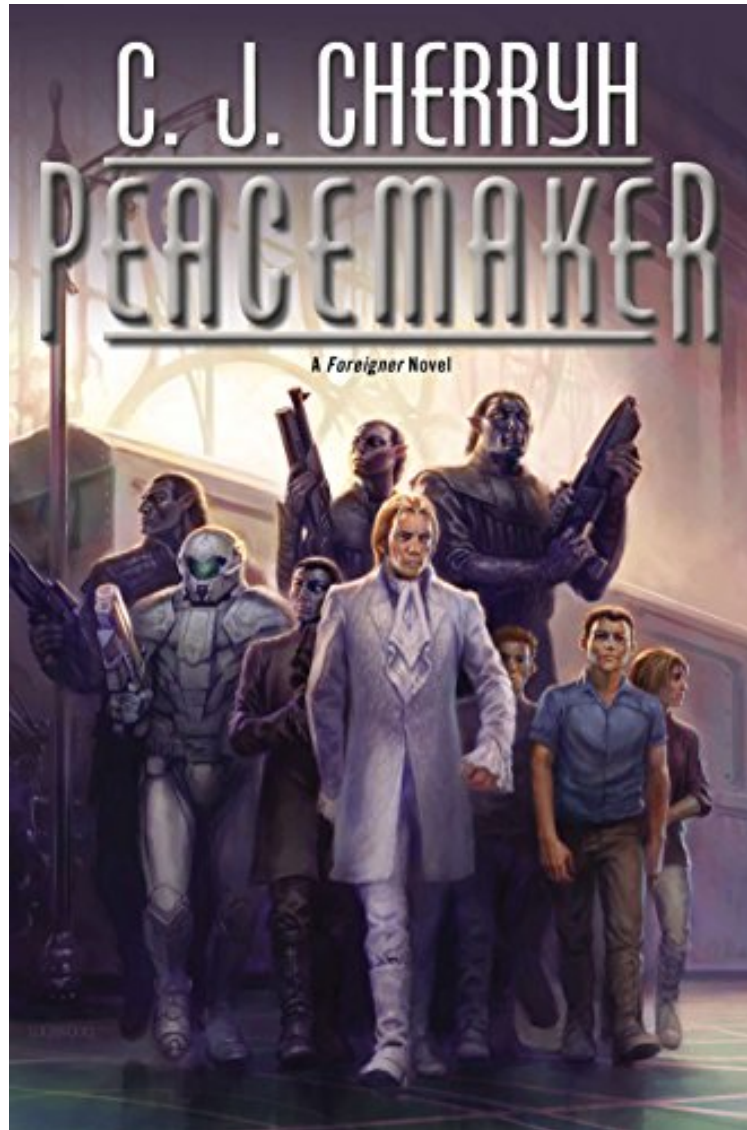

But this book is the fourth? fifth? that takes 200+ pages to describe the events of a few days in minuscule details - and this is getting tedious. I get the feeling that the author does

not know where she wants to take the series in the end, and writes one too-long book after the other to stall the fans' impatience while she finds out. Please don't! Some Pacing Problems Von swanpride Is has become my policy to see each trilogy as a whole...and I have to say that this time around that the series is slowly falling in the "long series" hole. A major problem is the need of the writer to explain again and again what happened in the former books. This might make some sense at the start of a new trilogy, but becomes cumbersome to a degree that by now each book has one to two chapters which are basically summaries of what happened before, and much more detailed than it is needed. The guild rules for example are established no less than three times in this last book. Next are continuity errors...suddenly Damiri supposedly doesn't know to what level her son speaks the human language, even though there was a whole scene about the issue in an earlier book. Irene was originally introduced as Arthur's sister, but now she has another mother and there is no mention about them being siblings. Wilson-Padhi was supposedly a man who could think in the Atevi language, now he is suddenly someone who needed to consult his books all the time...said books which a padhi isn't even supposed to have at hand on the mainland according to the rules established early on. Not even the order of what happened so far is established correctly in the "overview" the book offers on top of all the explanations. Nevertheless, still a good book.
